EDITORIAL

THE DAWN OF A NEW ERA Hazrat Khalifatul Masih III Visits North America

The summer of 1976 will be remembered in the annals of the American history as a turning point in which the spiritual future of almost two hundred fifty million people of the United States and Canada was set upon a revolutionary course.

It has been a year of destiny. It has been the year when Hazrat Mirza Nasir Ahmad, the third successor of the Promised Messiah, stepped on the shores of the Westernhemisphere.

It has been the year of bringing the message of hope, peace, and spiritual revolution, to this materialistic region of the modern world - a message to be delivered by the blessed successor of Hazrat Mirza Ghulam Ahmad, chosen by the Almighty to lead the world to the teachings of the perfect faith of Islam.

It has been the year in which the cherished dream of the Ahmadiyya Muslims of the United States and Canada finally materialized. Beginning on July 25th, when the Hazrat landed at the nation's capital, the members of the Movement started to receive their long-awaited spiritual nourishment. For them it was a time of joy, of supreme bliss, the time when their souls were uplifted and their hearts' desire was finally fulfilled.

The following three rather hectic weeks of the Hazrat's stay witnessed him in Washington D.C.; Dayton, Ohio; Madison, New Jersey; the site of the twenty-ninth Annual Convention of the Ahmadiyya Muslims of America; and Toronto, Canada.

Everywhere there were long, busy hours of Hazrat's conferences with the sisters and brothers, individually and in groups, hours of dispensing spiritual sustenance, of rendering counsel, direction and guidance, of applying the healing balm to the hearts agonized with the complex, perplexing problems of the materialistic environment.

These were also the days of planning ahead for the coming decades toward an effective exposure of North America to the teachings of Islam. Press conferences were held. Islam's response to the social, economic and international issues of our times was discussed at receptions arranged to honor the Hazrat in the cities that he visited. The believers were led in fervent and ardent prayers for the welfare of the entire mankind, for Allah's succor to descend on this globe which seems bent upon leading itself toward the wreckless path of self-destruction.

It has also been the year when the annual convention of the Ahmadiyya Muslims of North America was blessed with the presence of their beloved leader. Men and women, young and old, converged to the university town of Madison, New Jersey, from far and near, constituting the nucleus of an Islamic society set in sharp contrast to the material values of the alien environment surrounding this unique assembly. For two days they were addressed by the Hazrat on various occasions giving them both an inspiring as well as a soul-searching experience.

What is offered in the following pages is a glimpse of these memorable three weeks as seen by the American and Canadian press. By their very nature, these dispatches can only offer some individual and rather limited impressions. A few inadvertant mistakes of facts and substance have however, found their way in some of these otherwise so superbly written dispatches. The writers of these news reports deserve our gratitude and appreciation for a job so excellently done. One does not expect these correspondents, however, to be fully well-versed in the matters of theological doctrines. We have found it desirable to add brief explanatory footnotes, wherever necessary, to correct some of the more serious errors fully realizing, that they have been made only unwittingly.

In addition, some news reports have erroneously underestimated the numbers of the Ahmadiyya Muslims in the U.S.A. Actual numbers exceed three thousand at present.

It remains for the future to evaluate the full impact and true significance of the Hazrat's brief visit.

We believe that it was North America's rendezvous with destiny.

We believe that the Hazrat's visit places heavy responsibility on the shoulders of the believers. Theirs is the task not only to take the message of Islam to every inhabitant of North America but also to become the living examples of a truly Islamic way of life.

Only when the Ahmadiyya Muslims fully understand their responsibility can the fruits of the Hazrat's visit be fully realized. Only then we can properly enhance and perpetuate its blessings.

GETTING TANGLED UP IN MIXED METAPHORS

I know one thing for certain. If we had about 215 million more Ahmadi Moslems in this country all our crime problems would be over. They claim that they have absolutely no record of any of their American members having their names inscribed on the police blotter. A zero crime record. Unbelievable.

Except that I want to believe. Therefore, it is believable. And I congratutate this country for being able to host them whether the 2 million "mainline" Moslems who live here agree with them or not.

The Moslem faith, like Christianity and Judaism, the religions of "the People of the Book," is by no means monolithic. This is something that all three religions do not apologize for, nor should they ever have to.

Diversity, so long as basic truth is not sacrificed, is what makes the faiths so downright interesting, although admittedly confusing to the casual observer.

But, in common with Christianity, and to a lesser degree, Judaism, there are groups which identify themselves as the "true" Moslem faith who believe that the mainstream of their religion is in need of restoration to its original purity. The Ahmadiyya movement in Islam is one of these groups.

The Ahmadi are not at war with anyone, but they're fighting with evangelical zeal to try to get a certain point of view across. And with the views that they have in a few major areas of belief, it's a good thing they are not trying to do it within the framework of Christianity.

If the Rev. Sun Myung Moon's followers think they have troubles in "restoring" Christianity to its pristine glory, the Ahmadi would really be in for it in the Christian context. But the Ahmadi, being part of a decidedly minority religion in the United States and Canada, go almost unnoticed in what would be considered radical and even heretical restoration attempts were some group trying to propogate similar ones in Christianity.

Parallels in Christianity to Islam's Ahmadiyya movement are such disparate groups as the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormons), Jehovah's Witnesses and the latest arrival of restorationists on the scene, Moon's Unification Church.

Even though all three are diverse from one another in major areas, and differ from one another in major areas, and differ from mainstream or historic Christianity at major junctures, each considers itself bent on restoring the authentic Gospel of Jesus.

I have made it a point to have many friends in all three of these expressions of the Christian faith, but I am by no means a devotee of or advocate for any of them. The rightness or wrongness of each's belief is not for me to decide for any of my readers. In America, thank God, they have a right to hold to their point of view and to try to persuade others, no matter how vehemently you or I might disagree.

The only reason I combine them in the same paragraph is that they have restoration of Christianity in common. Nothing pejorative is intended. That (I hope some of the more perspicacious among you will see it that way) will help to put the Ahmadiyya movement of Islam into its own perspective.

Being this far into the column, I get that sinking feeling that no one got up this morning really caring whether I put the Ahmadiyya movement into perspective or not. Plenty of Saturdays have been just fine without such theological gyrations.

But you're hooked. You'll read on to the end just to see if I say anything bad about the Unificationists, the Witnesses or the Saints. Or the Ahmadi. I'll just string you along for a little while.

Tomorrow through next Saturday, the international leader of an estimated 10 million Ahmadiyya Moslems will visit Washington as part of his plan to accelerate the spread of "true" Islam throughout the Western Hemisphere. The leader is Hazrat (the revered) Mirza Nasir Ahmad.

As the caliph of the Ahmadiyya movement, Ahmad is the grandson of Hazrat Mirza Ghulam Ahmad, founder of the movement headquartered in Rabwah, Pakistan.

Based on Ahmadi beliefs, this makes him in fact not only the grandson of the founder of the century-old movement, but the scion of the promised Messia, or Jesus in His Second Coming. Moon, you see, has no corner of being Jesus in His Second Coming. The Ahmadi believe He came back, in the person of their founder, a century ago.

Grandson Ahmad then, is following in the footsteps of his grandfather, who also had the title of Mahdi, meaning that he is regarded by his followers as the restorer of the Islamic faith.

The Islamic faith is considered by the Ahmadiyya Moslems to have undergone weakening influences during its 14-century existence, one of which has been dropping the authority of the caliphate. A caliph is regarded in Moslem thought in much the same way the Apostle Peter or Pope Paul is in Roman Catholic thought.

The Old Testament prophets, plus Jesus and Mohammed, planted the "seed" in their times, as Moslems look at the progression of spiritual truth which they feel finds its culmination in the Koran and Islam. switch to the Christian metaphor, they were picked to watch over the flock. Without that shepherding, the Christian sheep would go astray.

In Islam, the caliphate was intended for the care of the spiritual crop, to switch back to the Moslem metaphor.

M.S. Shahid, the missionary in charge for spreading the Ahmadiyya movement in the United States, says that "as long as Moslems held the rope of the caliphate in their hands, the victory was on their side and their dominions stretched from Spain in Europe to India and China. But as soon as they turned their backs on the caliphate, they started declining and eventually lost their whole power."

As I read what he says, even though he did throw a rope into the metaphor when I wasn't looking, without the man at the top, flop goes the crop.

Although Washington long has been one of the centers of the movement, Ahmad's visit here and in several other American and Canadian cities will be the first for any of the latter-day caliphs. The Ahmadiyya mosque is known as the Fazle Mosque, at 2141 Leroy Place NW. Other mosques are in Dayton, Troy (near Dayton), Brooklyn, Pittsburgh, Chicago, and Athens, Ohio.

The Ahmadi differ from the mainline Moslems, among whom I have many deeply admired friends, in their notions about Jesus among other things. The Ahmadi don't believe Jesus died on the cross. His death and resurrection were only apparent.

What really happened after that whopper of an apparition is that Jesus migrated to what is now Kashmir so He could preach the Gospel to the Kashmiri. It is reminiscent of Mormon belief that Jesus, after His death, can to North America to preach the Gospet to its Mormon belief that Jesus, after His death, came to North America to preach the Gospel to its

The Ahmadi believe that Jesus died at the ripe old age of 120 and they point to His tomb at Sirinagar in India as part

of the proof.

I'll have to admit that the Ahmadi would have to do some long, fast talking before I'd let them "restore" any of my beliefs about what really happened to Jesus and I think I'm safe in saying the same for all the Moslems I've gotten to know over the years. Right now, that's neither here nor there.

But I certainly do admire their record with the law enfourcement people. Caliph Ahmad, we know you're bent on sending more missionaries over to the United States and Canada. That's certainly your prerogative.

Don't be too surprised if all that many people over this way are not interested in the steak you serve. But I've

certainly got to admit that the sizzle is something.

Remember the rope that Missionary Shahid got tangled up in my earlier metaphors? Well, that's what I just used to tie down this final metaphor of the column—Caliph Ahmad's steak. Can't afford to throw away anything these days.

Especially when you're in the business of stringing people along on some far-out yarn.

AHMADIYYA MOVEMENT ISLAM SECT LEADER TO VISIT

The head of the Ahmadiyya Movement in Islam will visit Dayton this week as part of a Bicentennial tour of the United States.

Hazrat Mirza Nasir Ahmad, 67, is the grandson and third elected caliph, or successor, of Hazrat Mirza Ghulam Ahmad, founder of the movement.

He will arrive from Washington, D.C., tomorrow afternoon and lead evening congregational prayers at 5:30 at Fazle-Omar Mosque, 637 Randolph St. Afterward, he will meet with the congregation.

A dinner in his honor, hosted by the Ahmadiyya communities in the Midwest region, will be held at 6:30 p.m. tomorrow at Model Neighborhood Community Center, 1530 Germantown St.

On Monday he will hold a news conference at 11 a.m. at the Biltmore Towers and appear at a reception at 7 p.m., also at the Biltmore. There will be a banquet in his honor at 7 p.m. Tuesday at the Biltmore. He is scheduled to leave Wednesday morning.

Appointments to speak with Ahmad can be made by calling the Dayton mosque, one of seven in this country. The others are in Washington, Chicago, Pittsburgh, Brooklyn and Troy and Athens, Ohio.

HEAD OF AHMADIYYAS TO VISIT AREA

MUSLIM LEADER VISITS CITY 'TO TEACH PEOPLE TO LOVE'

Hazrat Mirza Nasir Ahmad, 67-year-old spiritual leader of a Muslim sect with about 100 followers in Dayton, said he came to "the most sophisticated nation in the world to help

people to learn to love each other."

The white-turbaned Ahmad, who arrived in Dayton Sunday from Pakistan, said that although most of his sect's Dayton members are black there are missionaries working among whites. He said his sect is not related to the Black Muslims.

Ahmad said his community, the Ahmadiyya Muslims, arrived in Dayton about 30 years ago. M. Ibrahim is one of the sect's missionaries. Ibrahim said he has lived in Dayton at the sect's 637 Randolph St. mosque for three years.

Ahmad said his grandfater began the Ahmadiyya sect, which he said is known as one of the most "cheerful" of the Muslim groups in Pakistan. Its followers believe in life after death, he said.

LOVE IS ALL, ISLAMIC LEADER DECLARES

Love is the answer to all world problems and crises, Hazrat Hafiz Mirza Nasir Ahmad, head of the Ahmadiyya Movement in Islam, feels.

"It is time for man to learn to love man," he told local

Ahmadies on a visit to Dayton early this month.

Hazrat Ahmad, 67, is the grandson of Hazrat Mirza Ghulam Ahmad, founder of the movement in 1889 in India. Hazrat is third successor as head of the community.

He lives in Rabwah, Pakistan, headquarters of the sect since the partition of the subcontinent in 1947. His recent

visit was the first he has paid to this country, where Ahmady missionaries introduced the movement in the early 1920s.

The fundamental problem facing society today, he waid during his visit, is that "humanity has lost its bearing."

Each person has been given inherent physical, moral, intellectual and spiritual powers. He said Muslims believe Allah has created the means for achieving full development of the four faculties, which is every person's right.

The communists, particulary the Russians, overemphasize intellectual and physical development, while ignoring moral and spiritual, he said.

"All powers are interlinked," Hazrat Ahmad explained. "The development of each helps the others."

The Muslim leader visited Dayton because it is the headquarters of the movement's Midwest region. M. Ibrahim, the missionary here, "shepherds" about 100 families at the Fazle-Omar Mosque, 637 Randolph St. The congregation is inter-racial, although the majority of local members are black. There has been a mosque here for 30 years.

There are also missions in Athens, Troy and Cleveland. M. Ibrahim came to Dayton three years ago from Pakistan.

He said that Muslims believe they must develop a personal relationship with God through prayer. Islam is universal, he said, because it embodies the essence of all other religions. They believe in all the prophets of all religions, particularly the Biblical prophets. The Quran is their scripture, believed to be the very word of God, intact for 1,300 years, since it was revealed to Mohammed.

They eat no pork and intoxicants of all kinds are banned because they might prevent performance of prescribed duties, such as prayer five times a day. Women are veiled from head to foot when in public or in the presence of men outside their immediate family. At Friday worship, men and women are separated by a curtain while the missionary discusses everyday problems and offers solutions from the Quran. The woman's place is generally in the home, although she may work outside if necessary as long as her job does not detract from her dignity.

Hazrat Ahmad's grandfather was a reformer. Ahmadies believe, of the 73 Islamic sects, they have the correct (Continued on page 18)

GRANDSON OF PROMISED ONE TERMS ISLAM THE ONLY WAY

Some of the men were moved to tears praying with the solemn, grandfatherly figure. Most of the women delegates never even got to see the man who looked sort of like Burl Ives, though they could hear his voice through a partition in the college gymnasium.

The man was Hazrat Mirza Nasir Ahman, grandson and third successor of The Promised One, and his message to 600 of his 10 million Ahmadiyyan followers was that there is no hope for humanity outside Islam.

Dressed in flowing robes, saris, or dashikis, with many of the women veiled, the listening believers were delegates to the 29th annual convention of North American communities in the Ahmadiyyan Movement over the weekend at Drew University.

Rubbing elbows with weekend joggers, tennis players and Shakespeare festival stagehands, they gathered Friday and Saturday to pray and exchange ideas about their Islamic evangelical sect in what was described as "a true Islamic society in the midst of an overwhelming materialistic environment."

"The reality is that Christianity has failed to solve the problems of the world," Ahmad said. His grandfather, the Promised Mahdi (restorer of the faith), promised he could solve all the problems of the world through Islam, he said.

In a short address Ahmad said Islam is the only remedy to America's problems, droned some melodic incantations for peace, and led the delegates in silent prayer which was punctuated by sobs from members of the audience. To the uninitiated Judeo-Christian it was unclear whether the men were crying with joy on seeing their spiritual leader in the flesh or regretting his imminent departure.

Ahmad's grandfather, Hazrat Mirza Ghulam Ahmad of Qadin, the Punjab, founded the evangelical sect in 1889, apparently trying to combine the thrust of major world religions under a universal Islam. Besides the promised *Mahdi*,

he claimed to be the second advent of Christ, an incarnation $\dagger\dagger$ of the Hindu Krishna and a *buruz*, or reincarnation, of Muhammad.

Missionary for the Midwest Mian Muhammad Ibrahim explained, "What separates Ahmadiyya from not only the Muslims but from all other religions is a belief in ongoing revelation. If God spoke yesterday, he certainly can speak today. There is also the belief in the universality of prophets. It brings us closer together, closer to world unity."

Another key belief, he said, is Ahmad's reinterpretation of the Islamic precept *jihad*, or holy war, to mean persuasion by the pen rather than the sword, and a submission to temporal authority in temporal matters approximating the Christian "rendering unto Caesar."

Ahmadiyya is disowned by orthodox Muslims because Ahmad claimed to be an inspired prophet, while in Islam Muhammad is supposed to have been the final prophet.**

†† If the reporter is alluding to the traditional Hindu doctrine of incarnation which usually is interpreted in terms of actual embodiment in flesh of Krishna or Muhammad then it is clearly contrary to the Ahmadiyya beliefs.

The Promised Messiah never claimed that the soul of either Krishna or Prophet Muhammad had embodied in him. The Ahmadiyya belief is founded on the concept that the Promised Messiah came im the spirit of the revered messengers of God reflecting in his person their traits and characteristics.—Ed.

**What we believe is that "The spiritual universe will continue to be ruled by the Quran and the Holy Prophet of Islam till the end of days. But man is liable to forget, is apt to fall into error and is prone to revel. To maintain the donimion of the Quran it was necessary to provide a remedy for all these ills. Provision was necessary that the forgetful may be reminded, the erring set right and the rebellious brought to submission. We learn from the Quran that as in the material universe the moon obtains light from the sun and illuminates the earth when the light of the sun is not directly available, in the same way men will continue to appear who will obtain spiritual light from the Holy Prophet (Continued on next page)

Ahmad's liberalization of Islam, especially its principles of social justice and egalitarianism, appealed originally to middle-class Muslims, and while decidedly non-racist, is fairly close to the American Black Muslim social and political outlook.

Men and women entered the auditorium/gymnasium by separate doors and were blocked from each others' view by a partition, although squalling children and an occasional crash were audible from the other section. Speakers, including Ahmad, stood on the men's side of the floor, unseen to the women.

A women's exclusive session was scheduled "to deliberate on problems peculiar to the female society."

A basic tenet of Ahmadiyyan Islam is that each person should develop his physical, moral, spiritual and mental faculties to their fullest. This of course necessitates equality of the sexes, said the prophet, who added that in the Quran

and will continue to illumine the spiritual universe. These men in accordance with the degree of the need which they are designed to fulful will appear in the shape of Reformers, but in the case of wide-spread disorder and mischief in the spiritual realm would be appointed as Prophets subordinate, and in strict obedience, to the Holy Prophet. The Quran indicates at various places the appearance of one such Prophet who would be the spiritual image of the Holy Prophet and whose advent would be regarded as the advent of the Holy Prophet himself. In the Tradition, this image of the Holy Prophet has been given the name of Messiah and the Ouran also at one place indicates the applicability of this name to him (43:58). Another name mentioned in the Traditions for this Prophet is Mahdi. Both these names, however, are applicable to the same individual, though they express different capacities. The Gospels also refer to this second advent of the Holy Prophet by holding out the promise of the second advent of Jesus." (Hazrat Khalifatul Masih II, Introduction to the Holy Quran) -Ed.

men are commanded to uphold the rights of women," a press handout said. It pointed to a 100 per cent literacy rate in Rabwah, Pakistan, the sect's center, compared to 7 per cent in the rest of the country.

Those surveying the throng outside could hear a mixture of Pakistani, Indian and a scattering of African and European languages. One black woman dressed in a colorful, flowing outfit was asked if she could explain the seperate-but-unequal facilities and how she felt about them.

She turned out to be from Teaneck. "I'm not a delegate. I'm not even a Moslem. I'm the mother of one of the speakers, and my son's friend made me this outfit because she said I had a Moslem body," she explained. "They almost always separate the gentlemen from the ladies. Ususlly I don't notice it but it does take some getting used to," she said.

interpretation of Islam, according to M. Ibrahim.

"To us, Islam is a religion that appeals to modern man," he said. "It solves all problems, economic, moral and spiritual. The Quran contains injunctions to solve world problems."

The movement has about 10-million members worldwide, several thousand in this country. During his visit, Hazrat Ahmad counseled the local community on expanding its membership and offered guidance to individuals on personal problems. He receives several hundred letters daily and tries to answer them with guidance.

MUSLIM TELLS SECT'S AIM

The teachings of Islam will succeed, where Christianity has failed, in solving the problems of mankind, Hazrat Mirza Nasir Ahmad, spiritual leader of more than 10 million Ahmadiyya muslims, said here yesterday.

His Holiness met reporters in New York while on his way from the movement's Rabwah, Pakistan, headquarters to the annual gathering of American members of the Evangelical sect today and tomorrow at Drew University, Madison. The movement has established centers in more than 20 American cities.

The Ahmadiyya movement, one of more than 70 muslim sects, was founded 87 years ago in India by the grandfather of its current head. His Holiness stressed yesterday that among the principal goals of the Islamic faith is that each individual be allowed to develop his physical, mental, moral and spiritual potentials to the fulles—Seated on a plush sofa in the Waldord Astoria Tower, His Holiness commented in Oxford-accented English thatt "humanity has lost its direction." He said that as is the case with Christianity, the two leading economic-political movements, capitalism and communism, have come up short of providing fulfillment for mankind.

"Capitalism has failed to share its gains with the common man, and has become a reactionary movement," he said.

As for communism, its prophets talk of satisfying each individual's "needs," but do not deal with men's rights, he continued. "Allah commands that all be developed to the fullest," he said. "Then a person gets what is his 'right'."

Mankind must turn away, he went on, from attempting to solve all of its problems through purely human means. A more spiritual approach must be adopted, he said.

"Reason alone is not enough for well-being, progress and health," he said.

The Ahmadiyya movement has been making progress in winning converts in the U. S. since its introduction here more than 50 years ago, according to His Holiness.

The Ahmadiyya Movement in Islam convenes its 29th annual convention this week at Drew University with a historic visit and inaugural address by its spiritual leader, Hazrat Mirza Nasir Ahmad.

The primary purpose of Hazrat Ahmad's first visit to this country is to spread the doctrine of Islam, which he views as the only remedy to the ills of American society.

The Ahmadiyya Movement, noted for its evangelical zeal, was founded about 87 years ago and has more than 10-million followers worldwide. There are about 3,000 followers in the U.S. and a few hundred in New Jersey, says Dr. Madid Ali, a spokesman from the Teaneck Parish at 131 Intervale Rd.

In a recent interview, Dr. Ali explained that the Ahmadiyya sect does not differ in principle from the other sects, which include Sunni, the largest; Shiyya; Ismalili, and Whabis. However, he noted that the Ahmadiyya is the only organized Islamic missionary movement in the world.

The Ahmadiyyas have established more than 50 active centers and have built mosques, hospitals and schools all over the world, he said.

Hazrat Ahmad, the third successor of the founder, was elected as Caliph in 1965. Under his leadership, said Dr. Ali, many new plans for the propagation of Islam have been launched on a worldwide scale.

At the convention, according to Dr. Ali, Hazrat Ahmad will reveal a plan for the establishment of a community center in the U.S.

"Outside Islam there is no hope for humanity," according to Hazrat Mirza Nasir Ahmad, world leader of 10 million Ahmadiyya Muslims, in his first American press conference at the Waldorf Tower, New York City, and Drew University, Madison.

Hazrat Ahmad, a native of Rabwah, Pakistan, and a graduate of Oxford University, is the spiritual leader of the movement founded 87 years ago by his grandfather, Hazrat Mirza Ghulam Ahmad, who is believed by Ahmadiyyans to have been the promised Messiah. Hazrat Nasir Ahmad is therefore the third successor of the Messiah.

Ahmad's tour of cities in the United States and Canada included preaching to his followers in this country and other Americans in order to promote a better understanding of evangelical Islam.

At Drew University he addressed more than 600 Ahmadiyyan Muslims at their annual convention. Delegates were in attendance from all over the world.

"The reality is that Christianity has failed to solve the problems of the world," said the spiritual leader, whose movement has attracted followers in the United States for more than 50 years. He pointed out that his grandfather promised that he could solve all the problems of the world through Islam.

Ahmad discussed too the great world revolutions he has seen in his time, the capitalist and the communist. "Capitalism places more emphasis on material wealth, unlike communism, which stresses the intellectual sides of man," he said. He noted, however, that the Russian communist government is now in decline.

When questioned about the place of women in Ahmadiyyan society, Ahmad cited the literacy rate of 100 per cent among the girls in Rabwah, the center of the sect in Pakistan. The literacy rate for the rest of the country is seven percent, he said.



HEAD OF AHMADIYYA SECT HERE TO PROPAGATE FAITH

The leader of the world's 10 million Ahmadiyya Muslims arrived in New York last Thursday to begin a three-week tour of cities in the U.S. and Canada is not too impressed with the condition in which he found New York City.

Hazrat Mirza Nasir Ahmad told the Amsterdam News in an exclusive interview at the Waldorf Astoria Hotel where he was staying that he is pleased with the hospitality accorded him, but expressed shock to find one of the world's largest and most prestigious city very unclean.

This is Ahmad's first visit to the United States made at the invitation of the U.S. citizens who joined Islam through the efforts of the Ahmadiyya missionaries in this country.

Ahmad will urge Americans to seek in the Islamic teachings the answer to their many problems in religious, economic, family, and social spheres.

WORKING RELATIONSHIP

He said that he is convinced more than ever that ultimately, the entire world will accept Islamic solutions for the critical state of the social, economic and political institutions.

Ahmad wouldn't say precisely what plans he has for a working relationship with other muslim sects in the country such as the Nation of Islam and Suni Muslims. "I have made several trips around the world to meet with religious and political leaders in order to exchange views of problems confronting mankind," he said.

Before his election in 1965 to head the Ahmadiyya Movement, Ahmad served in various eminent positions in Rabwah, Pakistan, where the Movement is headquartered. He was principal of the Talimul Islam College for 20 years.

Saturday, Ahmad addressed a special national convention of the Ahmadiyya Muslims which was held at Drew

University in Madison, New Jersey.

The convention offered an unusual experience for those who were not familiar with the movement. In addition to moral and spiritual deliberations, contemporary social, economic and political problems were discussed from an Islamic point of view.

REVIVAL OF ISLAMIC TEACHINGS

The Ahmadiyya women delegates, in addition, held their special session to deliberate on problems peculiar to the female society.

In the United States, the message of Islam based on the Ahmadiyya teachings was introduced by Ahmady missionaries in the early 1920's and, since then, more than two dozen communities of its followers have been established in different parts of the country.

The headquarters of the Ahmadiyya Movement in the United States is located at the American Fazl Mosque in Washington, D.C.

Ahmadiyyas are dedicated to the cause of the revival of Islamic teachings. They hold Islam to be a living faith and are working to establish contact with the Creator of mankind.

They also believe that Islam can provide positive and satisfying answers to the spiritual, economic, social and political problems of mankind in this generation.

ESTABLISHED IN 1890

The Ahmadiyya Movement was established in 1890 by Hazrat Mirza Ghulam Ahmad of Qadian, India. On the basis of divine revelation, he claimed to be the Promised Messiah and Madhi who was to appear in later days to begin the prophesied spiritual unification of the world as foretold in various religious scriptures.

He claimed that on the basis of Quranic teachings, Jesus did not die on the cross, but was miraculously saved from such a death. His own research establishes that Jesus escaped to India and died a natural death and is buried in Kashmir.

The Promised Messiah was a recipient of divine revelations and thousands of his prophecies were published in advance and their fulfillment was a source of immense strength to his followers in the belief of his divine mission.

These prophecies related to many great events of global significance like the Second World War, the fate of the Czar of Russia, and the emergence of Japan as a great power.

LOOK OUT, HE WANTS YOU

An elderly, turbaned man with a Santa Claus beard and an almost perpetual smile says he has come from Pakistan to convert every American to the religion of Islam.

Hazrat Mirza Nasir Ahmad, spiritual leader of the Ahmadiyya Movement in Islam Inc., held a press conference at the Waldorf- Astoria the other day, to announce his arrival and declare his movement's mission "to win every heart which beats in the United States."

The khaki-clad 60-year-old Oxford graduate, whose "evangelical" Muslim sect claims more than 10 million followers worldwide, admitted it might take many years to accomplish this "long-range goal."

But Ahmad added that he was a patient man.

LOVE AND AFFECTION

"We will win these hearts with love and affection," he said, pausing to smile between phrases. "And when people realize this is the reality of our ways, then they will join us."

Surrounded by a handful of followers and a dozen reporters in the 33rd-floor hotel suite, Ahmad sat on a velvet couch beneath a pastoral oil in a gilded frame and fielded questions for more than an hour. Communism, capitalism and Christianity have all failed he said, and the religion of Islam is "a perfect and positive answer to the spiritual, social and political problems" of the Western Hemisphere.

Ahmad reputedly the grandson and third elected successor to Hazrat Mirza Ghulam Ahmad, who founded the movement in India in 1889 — is scheduled to preach these writings in several cities in the U.S. and Canada over the next three weeks. He reportedly undertook the journey, his first ever to the West, at the invitation of U.S. Ahmadiyyan communities in more than 20 North American cities. The sect, with national headquarters in Washington, D.C., was introduced into this country in the 1920's, according to pamphlets distributed by the group, but there are only an estimated 1000 U.S. adherents. The movement's world

"I believe that women should develop all of their faculties to the fullest. If a woman demonstrates abilities to be a doctor or a lawyer, then so be it." The women who were present at the press conference echoed their approval of Mr. Ahmad's beliefs.

Commenting on the moral decay of America, Mr. Ahmad explained that he thinks that United States citizens will be

more receptive to Islam as they examine their complex ills during the U.S.'s 200th birthday.

He pointed out that the Ahmadiyya Muslims have established health clinics in six African nations and have built scores of mosques in Europe and Africa. The Ahmadiyya's are also known for being prolific publishers of literature that gives indepth explanations of Islam as a positive spiritual, social and political force.

One reporter, probing a little deeper, asked Mr. Ahmad "Is it true that the Supreme Islamic Council of Pakistan has declared the Ahmadiyya's non-Muslim because of their belief that Hazrat Mirza Ghulam Ahmad was the promised messiah and prophet?"

Ahmad calmly replied that the Supreme Islamic Council's ruling was purely political. He said that Hazrat Mirza Ghulam Ahmad was only a servant of prophet Muhannad (peace and blessings be upon him) and that the man only brought fresh interpretations of the Quran. "Only the Quran and a person's conduct can tell who is and is not a Muslim — not politicians," he declared.

SOME TYPICAL PERSONAL IMPRESSIONS

(Below we reproduce some of the impressions about Huzur's visit sent to us individually, both by some Ahmadi and non-Muslim dignitaries. That will give our readers an idea of how deeply the Ahmadies felt inspired and animated and how profoundly the non-Muslims VIP s who had had opportunities of meeting with Huzur, were impressed by our beloved leader. VYING WITH EACH OTHER IN MAKING SACRIFICES (Br. Alhaj Muzaffar Ahmad Zafr, Regional Amir, Dayton)

Huzur's arrival in America was the greatest event in the history of our movement. By the grace of Allah, this was the year when Huzur blessed us by his presence. Seeing Huzur entering the lobby at Dulles Airport was the epitome of blessings for us Ahmadies in America. My blessings were just beginning.

My mind was full of anticipation concerning how will we benefit from this visit both Ahmadies and non-Ahmadies. This anticipation was removed after seeing the faces of Ahmadies having seen Huzur; they were aglow. One woman who was working at the airport asked me who were we expecting to arrive. I told her 'the supreme head of the Ahmadiyya Movement in Islam.' She said, she would not leave her post until he arrived so she could see him. After Huzur passed her, she was telling her co-worker how very impressive Huzur was. This was remarkable. By the grace of God, I was to see this happen many times during Huzur's visit to America.

To further elaborate on the benefits we received, the following day at the Amirs meeting, a problem that had plagued us for years, was cleared up in a jiffy. Answers were given and directions were shown that only one chosen by Allah could give with such deep understanding and precision. A week later Huzur entered our airport in Dayton, Ohio at about 2:00 p.m. We were filled with anticipation. This was the day that we in Dayton had planned for many weeks. Could we please our beloved Calif? To my gratification, while awaiting Huzur in the airport, I noticed that each member present displayed the discipline that Ahmadiyyat teaches. Lines were formed quickly by men and women and children.

When the plane arrived Huzur was met by other dignitaries who presented him with the key to the city. It was not so much as the presentation of the key, but the way Huzur received the key, that I shall never forget. Such conduct is exemplary and worthy only of one of high esteem.

As he entered the terminal, he was met with takbirs, As Salamu Alaikums, and other Islamic formulas. This was history making for me for the first time in the city of Dayton, this had taken place and by the grace of God, I was to witness it.

He greeted us (the men) with a handshake and exchanged greetings with us, sometimes making statements or asking questions of a particular member. Attention was given to the children also. Whenever my own daughter sees a picture of Huzur, she says, 'he patted my cheek.' I am sure many other children make similar statements. So many rewarding incidents happened, I wish I had the time and the space to express them. I had had the pleasure of seeing Huzur tend to administrative matters with such concern and quality. At the reception we had a peep into another trait of his character. Whether a person was a dignitary or not, all were received with equal warmth, and attention. Mr. Benny Williams, one of our non-Muslim guests stated to other Muslims that if we did not follow this man we were fools, and God would be displeased with us. What a blessing to have such a model to imitate!

The thing that impressed me most, was that every Ahmadi during Huzur's visit was vying with each other to perform good works and making sacrifices to be near his beloved Caliph. The spirit of competing for the blessings of Allah has been aroused by Huzur's visit and my belief is that Islam shall, Insha Allah, triumph in America!

Nevertheless, I have never doubted that Huzur would visit America. On trips to the Jalsa Salana, he has told us over and over again, "I want to come, but I don't decide these matters."

His visit to our country can only be described as divinely inspired. As I watched him walk through the crowds of beaming Ahmadies, Huzur never appeared to be tired. It was as if some unknown force was guiding him.

Most impressive were his visits to the convention hall. As is the case where he goes, there is some confusion, but Huzur never seems to be affected by the confusion. He is above the confusion. Not once did he appear to be confused or disturbed by the habits and culture of Americans. Surprising because it is a culture that confuses and disturbs many native Americans.

But it is during his visits to the convention hall, that Huzur's presence seemed to make everyone feel at ease. He would walk slowly to the hall, stopping to greet faces he had recognized from the Jalsa Salana. He also took time out to greet little children, who flocked to him.

His most impressive visit to the hall was on the last day of the glorious convention. It was after his last speech when Huzur, walking out of the hall, asked members to form lines along the path, so he could personally greet each member.

The lines were formed immediately. Each Jamaat from the East coast to the West coast of America was represented. Huzur, walking and smiling as a light rain fell on the waiting Ahmadies, shook hands and talked to the members.

It was a touching scene. The spiritual father of the Ahmadi community, walking in the rain and greeting his

followers.

As I stood with the Waukegan Jamaat, waiting in anticipation, Huzur walked over to me with a smile and a slight twinkle in his eye, he said: "And how are you? I've missed you during this convention."

I was shocked, to say the least. I didn't even expect him to remember me from my two previous visits to his home in Pakistan, but he did.

Before I could reply, Huzur said: "Well, perhaps it is my fault that I've missed you."

Here we were, standing in the rain. I was standing before the most holiest man on earth and he was apologizing to me. I couldn't believe it and I couldn't get any words out of my mouth.

I just stood with water in my eyes and Huzur, with that certain twinkle in his eyes and warm smile, slowly walked away.

REALIZATION OF AN EARLIER DREAM

The incredible experience of being with the Hazrat Ameerul-Mominin brought us closer than we have ever been to the Holy Presence of the Creator who is All-Knowing and All-Seeing and exceedingly Merciful.

We have never been able to travel outside the United States and the Orient is still shrouded in mists of antiquity to our Western minds.

Suddenly, in the very modern airport of our Nation's capital, in the midst of our bicentennial fervor, he appears! THE MUSLIM SUNRISE

The Muslim Sunrise is a quarterly magazine, founded in 1921 by Dr. Mufti Muhammad Sadiq, the first Muslim missionary in the U.S. The magazine is an organ of the Ahmadiyya Movement in Islam, founded by Hazrat Mirza Ghulam Ahmad of Qadian, India (1835-1908). The Movement is currently headed by Hazrat Hafiz Mirza Nasir Ahmad — third successor — with headquarters at Rabwah (Pakistan).
